More Cycling News - by Alan Zoller

As predicted last month, CBS-TV covered the inaugural Tour of America bike race on Sunday, April 10. The race followed a 284-mile route from Virginia Beach to Washington D.C. in four stages over three days. The first stage, run Friday for 114 miles, was led by American John Eustice until late in the race. After 90 miles Eustice, riding one month after a horrible accident, was overtaken by Francis Castainy and the rest of the pack. At the end in Williamsburg, Castainy, 1982 French Sprint Champion, won by six inches over the rest of the pack.

In the second stage of 83 miles on Saturday, Paul Pearson and Patrick Moerlin led until the end in Richmond. At that point they were overtaken by the pack led by Leo Van Vliet. France's Van Vliet held off Holland's Le Bigaut to win stage two.

Stage three, also run Saturday, was a 9.3-mile time trial with riders leaving at one minute intervals. This very fast short race really changed the overall standings. At the end of the day they were: Holland's Bert Oosterbosch in 1st, Australia's Phil Anderson in 2nd, and Norway's D. Pedersen in 3rd.

The final lap of stage four was telecast live Sunday. After 76 miles from Fredricksburg to D.C., we were shown the last three miles in five minutes, with Italy's Riccardo Magrini passed in the final stretch by Fritz Pirard of Holland. Neither man was able to overcome the points of the previous day's leaders. The Overall Standings stayed with Oosterbosch, Anderson, and Pedersen.

Although it was great seeing more bicycle racing on TV, the time given to our favorite sport was minimal. The first three stages were covered in fifteen minutes and the final stage was shown in five minutes of the worst live coverage I have ever seen. The last stage looked more

like home movies than national television, with the picture bouncing around like a drunken flamenco dancer. Boxing and golf took up the remaining hundred minutes of the two-bour program.

We should, however, write to CBS Sports to thank them for their support of cycling and to request more complete coverage in the future. Their address is: CBS-TV Sports, 51 W. 52nd St., New York, NY 10019.

And one final note: ticket appli cations for the 1984 Los Angeles Summer Olympics are scheduled for national distribution in May, 1983. If you hope to attend, I would urge you to start planning ahead as the crowds are expected to be gigantic and the best seats will go on a first-applied, first-served basis at around \$18 each. Many hotels are already booked-up, but housing should be available with the thousands of Southern California cyclists who belong to dozens of clubs in that area. It might be a good idea for interested members to start contacting L.A. clubs over the summer, to make cheap travel arrangements before the rush, and to guarantee good seats for the bike racing (among other events).

LE TOUR . . .

Great progress is being made on the MS Le Tour 150-mile ride from Wheeling to the Wagon Wheel Resort in Rockton, Illinois, and return - June 11-12.

The Wheeling Wheelmen is responsible for the route - which Dick Ryan has beautifully done - and serve as ride leaders. Howard Paul will ride sweep as he did last year and Elliott Kanner and Phyllis Harmon are volunteers, too. Ariel Adams of the MS Society will be at the May meeting to fill you all in on plans and to sign up additional volunteers. Riders are to be sent out in "clusters" so each cluster will have a leader.

Those riding for pledges to raise dollars will need \$200 minimum. \$50 of that is due in advance, June 6. The balance of \$150 is due after the ride - on June 30.

TRIATHLON

Aug. 14 - Glencoe

The Wheeling Wheelmen will be handling the bicycling segment of the Triathlon August 14 from Glencoe Beach. Sponsored by Illinois Parks and Recreation, there will be a 1-1/2 mile swim in Lake Michigan, a 56-mile bike ride and 12-1/2 mile run. More details later.



Bikers spend more time along the right side of the road than anywhere else. In the view of host motorists we are an unpredictable obstacle in traffic and a disruption to smooth flow. Consideration for the motoris improves this situation and pays big dividends in terms of biker safety. Let me share with you some of my ideas on this important topic:

- Ride single file anytime automobiles are present.
- Occupy no more than three feet of the road. If the surface is poor move out more but do so gradually Avoid swerving back and forth.
- 3. When approaching an intersection, ride in the lane you would use as a motorist. Stay out of the right turn lane unless you intend to turn. Watch rear traffic in your mirror. If a turning motorist seems uncertain, put your left hand out and indicate your intention to stay in the through lane.
- 4. If there is no turn lane, check your mirror for motorists signaling a right turn. If the light is red, why not pull to the curb two or three car lengths before the light? This will encourage the motorist to make the turn on red if no other car blocks his way.
- 5. When passing an entrance ramp to an expressway, stay in the through lane and signal the motorist behind of your intention. Uncertainty on your part may cause them to rush ahead and cut you off. At exit ramps it is best to hold back until traffic clears and then move across to the right shoulder to be out of the way of additional traffic.
- When waiting at a light, be ready to move quickly when the light changes. Right turning traffic cannot move until you are out of the way.
- 7. If there are only a few cars going through the intersection with you, why not move to the right and hold back just enough to let them by? The motorist will appreciate it and you will have the road to your self.
- 8. Try to resist the usual balancing act when you meet a car at a fourway stop. Touch one foot to the pavement and watch how quickly the car moves across and out of your way. Try it!

Remember, folks, we are motorists as well as bikers - let's give one another a break.


The badges are green in the shape of Illinois. At the


