Moose Hunters BIKE To THEIR PREY

Don and Judy Stansfield sent in a newspaper clipping from Anchorage, Alaska. Sixty-nine hunters in Petersburg, near where the southeastern panhandle of Alaska disappears into Canada, had picked up permits for the two-week moose hunting season. They will slip on backpacks, sling rifles over their shoulders and mount their 10-speed bicycles.

Seems it's against the law to use motor vehicles to hunt moose. The all-terrain vehicles and three wheelers preferred by hunters elsewhere in Alaska are prohibited in the Thomas Bay hunt, so hunters use pedal power - easier than walking!

With 30 miles of deserted logging roads and many hunters on foot, no traffic jams are anticipated.

While vehicles may not be used for the hunt, they may be used to recover the meat and get it back to camp. Game officers monitoring the hunt will help by using their vehicles to pack the meat out.


THE PREZ SEZ

Having an L.A.W. Hospitality home listed in BICYCLE USA Almanac brings the most interesting people to my doorstep. Bernard Imbleau of Quebec, Canada, doing the outline of the U.S. was here in August, the George Davis family of Clinton, Iowa, camped in my backyard for the Harmon Hundred, and Robin Radtke will have been with me a delightful month before she flies back to San Diego Oct. 28. Also, for a week during this time, Bernard Magnouloux was with us. Odd that Robin, raising funds for La Fayette statue in Metz, France, should be here at the same time Bernard was...as the Countryside Reminder put it (with a full page picture of Robin and Bernard): "An adventurous Frenchman and a California homemaker cross spokes in Wheeling on their separate tours of the U.S. by bicycle."

We made tapes of Robin's songs and Bernard taught her French words so she could sing them to the French cyclists when she joins them next April to bicycle wherever LaFayette fought in Virginia and North Carolina. Robin rode our Quarter Century and the Harmon Hundred and both participated in the Bike-A-Thon. switching bicycles for 30 miles... she rode his 120 lb. bike and he enjoyed her light racing bicycle.

Robin went to Door County, La Crosse, Minneapolis, and talked and sang in LaFayette, Indiana. We were sorry when it was time for Bernard to continue his trip. Robin and I bicycled with him to a most perfect restaurant for both of them to enjoy lunch...the 94th Aero Squadron on Milwaukee Avenue in Wheeling. With the French flag flying overhead and the French chateau of World War I period, both were enchanted and we took several photos.


This is the first of the rallytype invitational events. The first one was March, 1967 and Dr. Paul Dudley White was guest of honor.

This is an ideal time of year for this event: weather is great in Florida, flowers, fruit, fresh pick-your-own vegetables and huge strawberries; balmy breezes swaying tall palm trees, georgous sunsets. Also, we northerners have had just enough cold, ice and snow that we can really appreciate the warm sun and going back to six weeks more of winter doesn't seem so bad.

Rides include Castellow Hammock, Alabama Jacks, picnic ride to Turkey Point, 20-miles to Botanical Gardens or 50-mile Wilderness Ride, Century Day, Bayfront Park or Metro Zoo ride.

Evenings include a fashion show, beer bust party, Race Across America slides, movies, and Banquet.

SHOE FACTORY EXPRESS - It was cool and overcast but a good day for bicycling. Terry Schwerin led seven riders over a new 34-mile route out to Elgin. The group lunched on chili and hot soup in a little old gas station near Lord's Park.

WHEELING BIKE-A-THON - It was uncomfortably cold in the early morning but workers were out setting up. Robin Radtke, "Lady LaFayette" and around the world bicyclist Bernard Magnouloux (ManYOUloo), were with us all day, pedaled 50 miles. Many thanks to the many volunteers. We didn't have a big turnout but will net close to \$2,000.

CHAIN O' LAKES - In what had to be the smallest turnout for a scheduled ride, two riders, led by Al Dargiel, set out in threatening weather for Chain O' Lakes State Park from Kildeer School. The fall colors seemed to be at their peak, outshining the dreary skies overhead. We rode through an intermittant drizzle into the park, ate lunch near the boat launch area and started out toward Wauconda Apple Orchard. Fish Lake Road found us scurrying for cover from a brief downpour. By the time we rolled into the Orchards, the skies had cleared partially, leaving us with balmy Indian Summer weather and making the final 10 miles back to Long Grove very pleasant.

Al Dargiel, Ride Leader (and occasional Sweep!)

KANE COUNTY RAMBLE - After all the days of rain October 13 was 70° and sunny. Terry Schwerin led twelve riders on this 50-mile ride from Elgin to a picnic lunch in Hampshire and back.

GREEN BAY TRAIL - No rain! But after all the heavy rain recently there were puddles everywhere. Deb Blomstrann improvised and re-routed the 12 riders through suburbs to Northwestern University for lunch. Bill Vargas' pedal fell off, so he rode Betty's bicycle back to their car while she stayed with his bike at Evanston Hospital. Joe Tobias improvised his own route on the way back, which caused Elliott Kanner and Carolyn Wells, visitor from Milwaukee, to lose the group.

TIGER AND PUSSY CAT - Jim Grant led both rides on a great bicycling day. 51° in the morning, up to a 60° high. Skies were overcast but there was only a light wind and colored leaves were beautiful! The morning route of 32 miles covered a well-known

rugged bicycling area criss-crossed by a number of Wheeling Wheelmen routes. The afternoon 20 miles were south and west in easier, but beautiful, bicycling country. As more and more developments go up with homes on one or more acres, invading our rural bicycling areas, the one advantage is that more scenic roads are put through, giving us an ever-widening choice of roads to ride.

OCTOBER MEETING - What a delightful meeting! The post-Harmon Hundred reports and thank yous were quickly disposed of, leaving well over an hour to Robin Radtke's story of her three years of bicycling - 3700 miles in Europe in 1983 and riding in Germany, France and a grim visit to East Germany in 1984. She rode with Dr. Alexander Maas, a famous French heart specialist and bicyclist, and 10 other Frenchmen on a 757-mile eight-day tour, which resulted in Dr. Maas' request that she be "Lady LaFayette" in the U.S. in a joint movement between French and American bicyclists to raise money to replace LaFayette's statue in Metz, France. Robin has a beautiful soprano voice and sang several songs for us, two which she composed while bicycling in Europe.

BERNARD MAGNOULOUX - This red-headed 31-year old Frenchman from near Lyon, France, has been on the road since May, 1981. Everyone enjoyed his talk/ slide show at Wheeling High School. He has a delightful sense of humor and his stories of experiences with "Rossinante", his bicycle, his sole companion through 36 countries and 36,000 miles so far on his trip around the world were entertaining, rib-tickling and, in some instances, horrifying. Half of Africa speaks French and the other half English, so communication was no problem, but water was. Arabs and natives shared their meagre water supplies -- muddy, bug infested--but missionaries found him and cured the resulting amoebic dysentery. There were 1200 miles of desert sand to be covered...400 of them wheeling his bicycle on a railroad track while he trod the railroad ties! One year off to recover from injuries from attack in Acapulco and on to Quebec and Wheeling. Robin Radtke ended the program with talk and song and both answered many questions before time ran out.

Bernard's souvenir-laden bicycle sparked much interest and many questions








Robin Radtke *Lady

"Lady Lafayette"

Gilbert, Marquis de La Fayette, was 18 when he learned of our struggle for freedom. He bought a ship, hired and outfitted soldiers and sailed to America to offer his services to George Washington. He induced France to join us in our Revolutionary War. Without his help we probably would not be America today.

We put his statue in Metz, France, in 1920, which Germany melted down for ammunition in WW II.

Now a Franco-American movement is under way to replace the statue.



Robin, of San Diego, is an enthusiastic bicyclist. She rides with Southern California cyclists, did RAGBRAI, Harmon Hundred, and is bicycling the country, especially to towns named LaFayette. It is a pleasure to listen to her relate her experiences and adventures!





America, bike up to Machu richu. Central America, Mexico, around Gulf of Mexico to Florida, up to Quebec, Canada, back to New York and to Wheeling.

Now on way to Salt Lake City, San Francisco, down coast to San Diego and to Orient, Nepal, India. Communist borders closed so fly to Turkey and back to France by May of 1987!
