Last month I asked for real life experiences. So, here are some. The names have been changed to protect the guilty (or innocent). The following two items are from the archives of bicycle history.

The first incident is a warning to the expert and novice alike: never think for a moment you are immune to tragedy.

While riding his bike on a route he had traveled many times, Tom Bryne made one serious mistake. He failed to heed a warning sign along a bike path which said, "Walk Your Bike." The sign was placed at both approaches to a small foot bridge used by cyclists and joggers.

Tom had seen the sign many times but never thought much of it. He came down the bike path and turned onto the bridge. At that moment his front wheel lodged in the expansion joint of the bridge. Panic set in and he tried to free the wheel. An instant later, the wheel came free and bike and rider were headed on a course straight for the edge of the bridge.

Tom and his bike went over the side and hit the water and rocks below. Tom was hurt and was aided by a passing jogger. Fortunately, he lived to tell the story. Tom claims that his helmet saved his life. The helmet suffered a 3-1/2" crack down the front left side! His plea to others is: Please read the signs on the bikeways and roadways. Pride, stupidity, or over-confidence is a poor substitute for a broken body, or your life.

In our second story, we are concerned with a fellow bicyclist who has been run off the road. This story, however, has an interesting twist.

One sunny day in May, Bill Hayes and 25 other riders were on a ride enroute to St. John, Indiana. The cyclists were riding single file on the right side of Steger Road. Bill was riding sweep when he observed a car coming toward them. The car swerved, then crossed the center line, veering towards the cyclists, forcing them off the roadway and onto the unpaved shoulder and ditch.

To avoid the oncoming vehicle, one rider struck another bicycle and went down. He was hurt with abrasions on his knee and thigh. As the vehicle passed the fallen cyclist, the driver gave the cyclist "the finger." The car continued on, traveling in the wrong lane with a flat front tire. Bill and three other cyclists pursued the car and confronted the driver in the parking lot of an apartment building complex.

The driver was uncooperative until Bill identified himself as a State Policeman. A short time later the Steger Police arrived and placed the driver under arrest for "improper lane usage." In court, the driver was found guilty and fined \$200!

It sure is nice to have the police on your side.

### From Bernard in Hong Kong

termard Magnouloux, of St. Ramber. France, had completed 40,000 miles on his around-the-world ride by bicycle in January in Los Angeles. Here is the latest letter from him.

March 8, 1986

Dear Wheeling Wheelmen:

From Los Angeles, where I was stuck two months waiting for a new passport, the cheapest Asian flight was Korean Air to Hong Kong, \$352. It included a short stopover in Seoul and that had been my first contact with Asia. A puzzling one: after a night in the Youth Hostel, I had to take a bus back to the airport and couldn't read the signs on bus stops. It was 6 a.m. and the streets were quite empty but the few people that I found had to endure my mime. It's difficult to mime an airport but it helped to mime a plane. The bus driver had white gloves and there was a hostess in uniform who took care of me like I was the only customer and made me regret that I was leaving Korea so soon.

Hong Kong was more of a shock: the traffic here is difficult to imagine, except if you could visualize every Peking cyclist being given a car...and on top of that, they drive on the wrong side of the road, the British side. My new bike, contrarily to Rossinante, had never done that and it took me some time to teach it.

I just passed a week getting ready for China (3rd largest country in the world): the 3 month's visa is \$10, the faked Taiwanese student card (necessary to get budget prices) only \$6 and Mandarin (the official Chinese dialect) lessons are free with the Hong Kong youths flocking the youth hostel on weekends. I'm told that my family name is very common in China as long as the last syllable is concerned. I hope it will help me bike incognito. I'm still not sure that I'll be allowed to bike across the border but as I may officially leave China into Nepal, I do intend to push my bike home all across Con-tinental Asia. That's still a few tires, flats and sweat away!




