SAFETY OFFICER'S CORNER - Howard Paul

Quite frequently on club rides I have noticed a particular breach of cycling courtesy and safety. After the leaders of a long string of riders go through a 4-way stop, one or more cars on the cross street reach the intersection and must wait until our whole group passes illegally. Sometimes this is allowed by good natured motorists who wave us on. However, when they don't, we are obligated to take our turn (perhaps a couple at a time) at crossing the intersection.

Occasionally irate drivers force their way through our group - sometimes narrowly missing bikers who evidently assume that our majority makes us right. Think about it.

Probably one of the reasons that we do this foolishness is our fear of getting too far behind the group ahead. Our ride leaders can help this situation by slowing the pace after a busy intersection to allow the group to tighten up.

These thoughts are really too late for this year's rides but, since this is a pet peeve, I'll probably drag it out again in the spring.

Our October club meeting was truly historic. Jim Parsons, one of the Wheeling Wheelmen's few members of The Wheelmen, (a national organization devoted to


antique bicycles) enlightened a small but highly interested group with a carefully prepared talk on the nature of the organization and bicycling history. His talk

We did ride through a genuine covered bridge, circled through a newly completed subdivision and experienced a pleasant variation on the theme of last year's ride. Dick Ryan was our competent leader.

Wheeling/Evanston Club Ride - Seven intrepid cyclists from the Evanston Bicycle Club pedaled the 18 miles from Evanston to meet us at the Wheeling Community Center for a joint ride to Kelsey's Road House for lunch. We enjoyed the brilliant, crisp, fall weather and a challenging headwind. It was one of those memorable autumn days when the foliage is beautiful and the weather is invigorating. We all enjoyed the camaraderie and the opportunity to ride and socialize with our Evanston friends.



New Glarus Weekend - The fifteen Wheelmen who participated in this weekend event found it one of the peak events of our whole cycling season. Several factors came together to make it memorable: First, we particularly enjoyed the sweeping panoramas of the rolling hills and Swiss architecture, charming restaurants and delicious food. Second, we were surprised with 35° temperatures Saturday morning, 35 mph winds with gusts up to 50 mph and gray, overcast skies that blocked the sun all day. Even though the temperature ranged to the upper 40s, the windchill factor kept us well bundled up. Also, coasting down the long, sweeping hills with gusty sidewinds added additional adrenalin to the challenge.

Saturday evening we feasted in style at *The Mansion, a lovely 15-room home filled with charming antiques and converted to a restaurant in Monroe, Wisconsin.

Sunday, after a McDonalds breakfast, we scraped the heavy frost off the car windows and headed for New Glarus for the Sunday morning ride starting from the headquarters of the Sugar River Trail which winds over an abandoned railroad route through Monticello, Albany and ends at Brodhead. Even though it started at 32° and still windy, the sun came out and the level route, protected with trees and shrubs, made it a delightful ride. W5 lunched hungrily in Brodhead before heading back over rolling, sometimes rugged, hills to Monticello and the last six miles over the trail to New Glarus. We passed many cyclists of all ages going both ways over the trail. This weekend, beautifully organized by Don and Judy Stansfield, deserves a repeat each year!

Tiger and The Pussycat Ride - This event more correctly should have been titled, Terrible Tiger and Wildcat Ride. We mistakenly thought we had left the wind in Wisconsin. No way! Whereas the hills were to be a challenge on the 30-mile morning ride, the wind stole the show. No matter which direction we went we had to struggle against the steady winds and gusts that kept us ever alert to stay on the road. We picnic lunched at Deer Grove in bright sunshine along the blue lake and, yes, the wind that tried to snatch anything loose. The more moderate afternoon ride without the hills left us still struggling against the wind but everyone, without exception thoroughly enjoyed the day and felt it was good training for the Hilly Hundred in Bloomington, Indiana, the following week. It was an applecrisp, sunny day topped off with beautiful fall coloring and much appreciated scenic rural scenery - what more could we ask for? Thanks, Don and Judy for a great day.
