Safety First

With the advent of the St. Patricks Day ride, the official spring/summer/fall riding season has begun. In looking over the responses to the surveys that many of you returned, a strong desire was expressed for additional shorter routes. At the same time, there was much dissatisfaction with the large number of rides that are located in remote areas (farflung McHenry, Kane, and DeKalb counties in Illinois and sections of southern Wisconsin). It is true that in the past the club did have many shorter rides that were closer in. The big drawback to scheduling these rides today (and they still are in the club library) is increased traffic congestion.

In the years since they were first developed, the surrounding areas have succumbed to urban sprawl, and what were lightly traveled roads are now busy thoroughfares. Now, that alone does not mean that the roads are unridable. It does mean that group rides require a much higher level of bike handling skill and a constant high level of attention. I like to ride in a relaxed way and be able to converse with my fellow cyclists. This is not a possibility when traveling in single file only, with cars whizzing past your ear every 10 seconds. To me and any other club member that I have spoken to, this is not relaxation it is aggravation. We haven't even brought up the potential health hazards of sucking exhaust fumes.

Some of the topics will include:

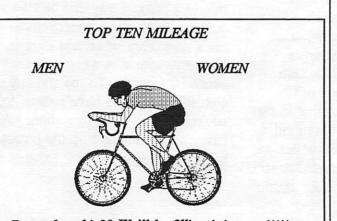
- *Safety

L.A.W. PRESS RELEASE

League of American Wheelman members have voted by an overwhelming majority to update the organization's name. Effective March 28,1994, it will be known as the League of American Bicyclists.

Preceding the vote, League President Robert Nordvall, wrote to all members explaining the following reasons for the proposed change:

- * To make it immediately clear to legislators and policy makers who we are, giving us the chance to explain what we want.
- * Increase our access to grantmakers and other sources of funds, allowing us to widen our education and advocacy efforts.
- * Identify us as bicyclists to all potential new members.
- * Improve recognition among the general public thereby enhancing the credibility and effectiveness of our message.

At 27,600 members, the League is currently at its highest membership in modern history, and growing. Innovative programs including the Safe Roads Movement, Bikes Fly Free, the International Police Mountain Bike Association, and the *Bicyclist Advocacy Bulletin* have all contributed to the League's current success.

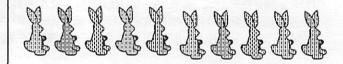

If you think making up a cue sheet is too difficult, assistance is available, just ask Ralph or myself or any other ride leader for help. A second option would be to carpool to the rides further out. This minimizes the amount of pollution generated, and also gives you someone to talk to on the way there and back.
