THE HILL AND DALE WEDNESDAY EVENING RIDES

How to Survive Slick Spots

The following is an edited version of an article By Fred Matheny and Ed Pavelka

- Painted lines. These can be slippery, especially the wide markings for pedestrian crossings at intersections. The paint fills in the asphalt's texture, producing a surface that's uncertain when dry and deadly when wet. The danger is worse when the paint is new.
- Dry oil slicks. These may be nearly invisible, but you can spot them as darker streaks on a gray pavement.
 Be real careful in corners. You aren't safe if you ride through oil on the straights. The greased tread might slip in a corner just ahead.
- Wet oil slicks. If it rains, a small oily patch can grow until it covers the whole lane. Be on the lookout for the telltale multi-colored water. There's no pot of gold at the end of this rainbow, only a black-and-blue meeting

with the pavement.

- Wet metal. If it's been raining and you come upon anything metal in the road (manhole cover, steel-deck bridge, road-repair plate), it's as treacherous as riding on ice. Cross it with the bike absolutely upright. Even a slight lean can cause the wheels to slip. Smart riders walk their bikes across wet steel bridges.
- Wet leaves. Be very careful in the fall, or you will.
 Even if the road is dry, there can be moisture trapped between leaves littering the pavement. When you see leaves in a corner, slow down and round the bend with your bike upright, not angled.
- Sewer grates. Some old ones have bars that run parallel to the street and are wide enough to let a bike wheel fall through. If this happens, you can look forward to plastic surgery and possibly a lifetime of lawsuit riches. Many municipalities have replaced such grates with bicycle-friendly versions, but be careful in case a town hasn't gotten the message yet.

ST. GERMAIN, WISCONSIN FALL COLOR FOUR DAY WEEKEND RIDES IN VILAS AND ONEIDA COUNTIES Friday 9-27 through Monday 9-30

These are very scenic rides that pass through state forests where maple, oak, and 100 foot high white pine grow right up to the side of the pavement to produce numerous 5-12 mile stretches where you ride through a tunnel of Fall color. The routes pass dozens of lakes, rivers, and streams. Because of curves, elevation changes, and the trees and shrubs, your line of sight is often only a tenth to a quarter of a mile. Deer, wild turkey, hawks, heron, and egrets are common; eagles, osprey, coyote, and fox are not uncommon; and bear and badger are possible sightings. Excellent dinners are available at a variety of establishments such as the Fence Lake Lodge, run by a Swiss resort management company, where the dining room overlooks the lake, and the view of the shoreline in Fall colors at sunset complements the cuisine. View the menu at www. fencelakelodge.com.

The headquarters location for the weekend will be the Whitetail Lodge in St. Germain. It has a heated indoor pool and the rooms have refrigerators, microwaves, and baths with whirlpool jets to sooth sore muscles. PLEASE CHECK CANCELLATION POLICIES!

Rides will start from Boulder Junction, Woodruff, and Eagle River. Riders can either meet at 8:00 AM at the Whitetail Lodge to convoy to the day's starting point or obtain direction sheets for all the rides from me ahead of time. Direction sheets will also be left at the Whitetail Lodge desk.

Pre-Ride breakfasts will be at Ella's Restaurant at Rts. 51 and 70(East) in Woodruff.

Weather: Historical average daytime highs for this time of year are 60 degrees F. Last year I was there through the first weekend in October and the highs were running from 65-75 degrees F. Late September and October are generally the sunniest time of the year.

The Routes: These are flat to rolling with some hills around the lakes. Members who have done the Germantown rides will find the terrain here to be similar. The rides and mileage options are:

9-27 Boulder Junction-Lac Vieux Desert 107/52 (52 mile option starts at 11:00 AM from first break point on the long route)

9-28 Woodruff-Hazelhurst 105/69

9-29 Eagle River-Three Lakes 104/82/62

9-30 Woodruff-Eagle River 102/82/72

Directions to the Whitetail Lodge: I-90 west to Portage; Take Exit 108 (Highways 51, 39, 78) and continue north on Highway 51 through Minocqua and Woodruff; East/Right on WI 70 (do not turn left/west on 70 in Minocqua) to County C; the Whitetail Lodge is on the northeast side of the intersection; enter from 70.

RIDES OF A DIFFERENT FLAVOR

In spite of the coldest, wettest April and May in recent times only one trail ride has been cancelled so far this year. For the first time weather has permitted the completion of the entire North Channel/Green Bay/North Shore Bike Paths from the south terminus near Lawrence Ave. where the Chicago River becomes navigable to the Bluff overlooking an azure Lake Michigan at Lake Bluff. The ride offers varied scenery passing through city parks, the Skokie Statue Park, the Evanston Arboretum and the affluent North Shore towns. In contrast we ended May with a ride on the Lake County Des Plaines River trail from its current terminus just south of IL 22 to Independence Park north of Libertyville. This ride is through a veritable tunnel of trees. With an alfresco lunch stop just off the trail at IL 60, a side loop through Vernon Hills local trails and the forest preserve loops along the way this great ride covers 46 miles.

In July the touring trails are featured. The two halves of the M&I Canal trail make up the longest continuous trail in Illinois and offer on an interesting and varied route. The ride to Illinois Beach takes us along the just completed Millennium Trail at Fairfield Rd., Wauconda east to Lake Bluff via the North Shore Path with a short gap on city streets in Midlothian. From there it's up the McClory Path to local Zion paths leading to Illinois State Park. There is a scenic 2-mile loop in the park requiring wide tires. Those with road bikes can visit the park museum during this stretch of the ride. The rest of the Paths are suitable for road bikes.
