Greetings fellow club members.

Our annual century invitational is in the books. The Harmon Hundred is the event that, I believe, exemplifies what we are all about as a bicycle club. I am proud to be a part of this great organization. We had over 70 members working on a hot and humid September day, taking care of 800 riders.

Two years ago we moved the venue to Wilmot. That first year it rained in the morning, but cleared up enough to attract enough riders to make it a successful event. Last year was tough. The rain started the night before the ride and did not stop all day. We had enough pre-registered and day-of riders to cover our costs, but the club relies on this event to meet expenses for other activities and fixed costs such as insurance. The actions of our member volunteers and Sag service that day were amazing. I'm sure our efforts to get everyone safely off the course and back to Wilmot generated a ton of goodwill, and brought a lot of those riders back this year.

We needed a good turnout this year and we got it!!! How important is the weather? Well we had about the same number of pre-registered riders both years, but this year an additional 400 riders came out. This put a lot of pressure on all the workers to get everyone parked, registered, fed and sagged if needed. I know there are a few areas we can improve on, and we will address those as we plan for next year. These are minor issues. The comments I've heard first hand and through other members was overwhelmingly positive. We are compared to other invitationals in the Chicago area and out of state. Everyone I spoke to said we were the best. They love the food, the routes, the service and especially the organization. We make it seamless for them so they can relax and enjoy the day.

We added a new excursion ride this year over Labor Day. I apologize for not getting the word out to everyone. We'll do a better job of that next year. We rode out of Thompson, IL. a small town on the Mississippi river about 40 mile south of Galena. The attraction is the annual Melon days Festival in Thompson, as well as Riverboat gambling, shopping and dining in Galena and of course great riding. We rode up to Chestnut Mountain one day and along the River the next. We'll map out more routes next year.
