I urge all of our members to send a letter or email to your local, state and federal legislators thanking him for supporting bicycle related legislation and appropriations. Anything we can do as a club and individuals to make cycling safer and more enjoyable are time well spent. Did you know that only 25% of the money needed to build and repair local and state roads comes from fuel taxes? The rest comes from general funds. So the next time a motorist tells you that you should not be on the street because you don't pay for gas, let him know that only federal highways are paid for by gas taxes and we don't ride our bikes on the interstate. The reason this comes to mind is the recent ruling by the Illinois Supreme Court upholding the "Boub" decision which basically says that with respect to liability laws bicycles are not "intended" users of roadways except roadway that are signed as a bike route or marked

with bike lanes. This has resulted in many cities are not putting in bike lanes when they repave roads fearing the additional liability. We need legislation to overcome this and the best way to get a legislators attention is to write to him. The LIB is helping draft legislation that could be voted on by late summer or fall. Let them know we appreciate their support. Ironically the bridge that Mr. Boub had his accident on is now closed because it's unsafe for cars.

Following in Darwin's Footsteps

The alarm goes off at 6 am. The room is swaying. Thank god not as bad as when I went to bed. As the cobwebs start to clear from my head. I hear the unmistakable serenading of sea lions in the distance. This is not a hangover, It's my last morning abroad the Nemo, an 80 foot catamaran that has been my home for eight days and seven nights while island hoping through the Galapagos. Yes, I traded my bicycle for a sailboat and cycling shoes for hiking boots to follow in the footsteps of Charles Darwin. I discovered firsthand how amazing these islands could be after only reading about it in grade school during our study of evolution.

Volcanic in origin, the Galapagos Islands straddle the equator, only 600 miles off the coast of Ecuador (that's in South America). The islands are brimming with wildlife and plants not seen anywhere else in the world. And since all native species are protected from hunting and harassment, they are incredibly tame. Sometimes they don't even wait for you to approach them...they come right up to you. Consequently, you have to watch where you step as they sometime hang out right on the hiking path.

Entry to the Galapagos Islands is strictly enforced. You must always be accompanied by a licensed naturalist. Alexis was our guide and provided not only an abundance of information about plant and animal behavior, but also a lot of laughs. His heavy Spanish accent kept us on our toes and had us renaming species. The Yellow Warbler (a small bird) became a Jell-O Wobbler. And since everything seemed to be named a Galapagos something, a Lava something or a Darwin something, if it didn't have a name it became a Galapagos Lava Darwin something.

Each evening Alexis would brief us on the morning and afternoon landings. Assuring me that each time we'd be guaranteed to see sea lions. Yes, I snapped rolls and rolls of sea lions. Upon return to the states I found myself going through withdrawals not seeing sea lions to photograph. Anyway, the landings were dry or wet. Wet meaning you had to wade ashore from the dingy. The briefing also went over what we would see and do on the islands. Each island was so different than the next. There were red beaches, black beaches, brown beaches, white beaches and even one with little green crystals. All determined by the composition of the volcanic soil. For example, the red beach was caused by a high concentration of iron and copper.

Every day brought a new adventure while we were hiking, snorkeling or sailing. One day in particular stands out and one of the most amazing things I've ever done...body surfed with sea lions. They'd imitate what I did-in all fairness they were much more graceful and agile

than I could ever be. At times we'd be nose to nose as we came flying in on a wave crashing into the beach. I could swear they were giggling right there with me.

I have books on the wildlife in the Galapagos and we didn't even scratch the surface while there. Here's just a sampling of the incredible and diverse wildlife I saw:

- Galapagos Giant Tortoises (Can be up to 150 years old and 1000 pounds. Like a VW Bug)
- Land Iguanas (something out of Jurassic Park)
- Marine Iquanas
- Lava Lizards
- **Galapagos Constrictor**
- Sally Lightfoot Crabs (bright orange, yellow and blue with eves that look like purple jelly beans)
- Stingrays
- Dolphins
- Sea Turtles
- Sea Lions
- Octopus
- Nazca Boobies
- Blue-footed Boobies
- Waved Albatross
- **Penguins**
- Flamingos
- Frigate birds
- **Brown Pelicans**
- Darwin Finches (Saw 5 of the 13 species)
- Galapagos Hawks (very rare and we saw 5)
- Lava heron
- Great Blue Heron
- White-cheeked Pintail Ducks
- Oystercatchers
- Yellow Warblers
- Mockingbirds

I feel blessed to have been one of only 60,000 people a year permitted to experience the magic first-hand. As with my trip to Kenya, it reinforced the importance of conservation and education. Without protecting the environment and educating people about the importance of maintaining the habitat for these animals, they can quickly become a thing of the past.
