On another note, if you have not done a bike vacation I'd highly recommend giving it a try. I've done a few rides this summer and my most recent trip was in August to BAM, Bicycle Around Minnesota, a four day tour. It goes around a different part of the state every year. This year it was around the Minnesota River Valley and southern lakes region of Minnesota. The tour started and ended in Mankato, approximately 1 1/2 hours southwest of the Twin Cities of Minneapolis-St. Paul, with overnight stays in Mankato, New Prague, New Ulm and Sleepy Eye.

BAM is mostly a camping trip with hotel options 1-2 miles from the campgrounds. As usual I opted for hotels; they even dropped your bags at the hotels at no extra charge.

The mileage ranged from 60-75 miles a day on paved roads with occasional riding on paved trails. The terrain in this area was gently rolling with several flat stretches and a few hillier sec-

KEEPING CYCLING GREEN

Riding a bike is more eco-friendly than driving a car, but what do you do after those tires and tubes wear out? They are not biodegradable and shouldn't end up in a landfill. Recently I was reading a blurb in a Bicycling Magazine that highlighted some companies that recycle and then set off to do some more research of my own.

I found out that the new term is Upcycling. Recycling turns stuff into the same thing over and over again. Upcycling turns something of lesser value into something of greater value. Here are a few businesses that are upcycling and recycling.

Cycle Dog – <u>www.cycledog.com</u>

They recycle and repurpose bike tubes into dog leashes and collars. They accept all tube sizes (except tubes with sealant in them). Send them to:

All four Chicagoland stores (including Northbrook and Schaumburg) recycle inner tubes and chains. So stop by the bike shop

area of the store with your items. They in turn ship the tubes to Alchemy Goods www.alchemygoods.com They turn blown out inner tubes, old seatbelts and advertising banners into useful stuff like bags and wallets. So far they've recycled 182,000 inner tubes!

It is harder to find places to recycle bicycle tires. I did a lot of research, called a lot of places. You can also contact your local tire dealer which may also charge a nominal fee to recycle the tire...but preserving our environment is priceless. If you know of a place that recycles bike tires, let me know and I'll be sure to share it with the club.


Banquet: Scheduled for November 13. Meg is coordinating.

tions. The weather was spectacular, cool to start, sunny all day no rain, however we did experience a nice challenge one afternoon, 15-20 mph headwind for a 22 mile stretch.

The ride was limited to 275 riders and it filled up very quickly. Three meals a day were provided, starting with breakfast on day one. Lunches were served on the road at the halfway point or later each day. Meals were served by a combination of local community/civic groups, caterers and restaurants. Rest stops were provided in local towns by rotary clubs and chamber of commerce volunteers.

We visited some quaint towns on the route; here are some of the highlights:

- ♦ The Le Sueur County Fair.
- New Prague, known for its Czech, Bavarian and Bohemian culture, they had beautiful painted murals throughout downtown.
- New Ulm, rich in German heritage, we went on the Schell's Brewery tour, it is the second oldest familyowned brewery in America, and dinner was local German fare followed by the Concord Singers, the foremost amateur German language singing male chorus in America.
- Butterfield, for their popular Threshing Bee Festivalan annual event showcasing how life was in the early pioneer days. They had everything from rug making to quilting, butter churning and candle making, along with various demonstrations of threshing and plowing using old-time machinery. There was live entertainment and a tractor parade featuring nearly 200 tractors!
- Sleepy Eye, the 50th Annual Buttered Corn Days parade

This was an extremely well organized tour. The people volunteering were wonderful and the bicyclists participating were as friendly as I have ever met on a tour. I would definitely do the ride again.
